

The **SHEAF/ESPIGA Foundation** affirms the concept of integrated development. Specific activities undertaken in a community must fit together to promote consciousness-raising, self-respect, and transformation of the individuals.

The officers of **SHEAF/ESPIGA** are dedicated to a holistic model of development which recognizes the need to integrate work, education and spiritual development. The officers have all enjoyed extensive work in pastoral ministry, social work and /or administration. They have all visited projects in Nicaragua and some have had extensive overseas service, particularly in Central America. They come, primarily but not exclusively, from The Presbyterian Church in Canada. They are dedicated to real and meaningful development in Central America.

**SHEAF/ESPIGA** projects are in place in Nicaragua and they will gradually expand throughout Central America.

## Current Projects

### Agricultural Projects

#### Cow Project

The objective is to help rural families by giving them a heifer calf to raise and keep. The cow becomes a welcome source of food (milk, cheese etc.) and income. The project is ongoing and sustainable because the first calves are paid to **SHEAF/ESPIGA**, who in turn gifts them to additional families with the same stipulation. This project was started in response to requests from rural families.

Twenty families currently have a cow and the first calves have been born. We hope to expand this project to others

### Macadamia Project

The objective of this project is to increase crop diversity by introducing an alternative crop to coffee in Nicaragua. The coffee market is inherently volatile, and causes economic instability and hardships, partially because it is so highly seasonal, for farmers. Macadamia trees can be inter-planted to provide shade for coffee and thus increase farm income and stability.

Eight farmers, who are active members of the Association of Farming Cooperatives, *Unión de Cooperativas Agropecuarias U.C.A. -San Ramon*) are now participating in this project. Their farms are located in different zones and at different elevations.

The farmers are small landowners with a couple of "manzanas" of land (1 manzana = 1.7 acres). Each of the participants cultivates 20 trees on about half a manzana. This project has been expanded by providing farmers with macadamia seeds from Costa Rica, Guatemala and El Salvador. These seeds have sprouted, meanwhile the first trees are now 3 years old and should bear nuts soon.

## Health and Educational Projects

The Batahola Centre holds worship services and teaches music, household, computer and restaurant skills to underprivileged groups. **SHEAF/ESPIGA** is proud to sponsor some of their



activities.

**SHEAF/ESPIGA** also supports the Moravian clinic in Managua which provides medical services to the marginalized including indigenous people.

### School for the Deaf

Handicapped people have a very difficult time in developing nations. This school has a day-time program and also allows students an opportunity to board.

**SHEAF/ESPIGA** is privileged to be able to give scholarships for poor students.

### Rural Travel Scholarships

Students in rural areas have elementary schools nearby but must travel to high school. The transportation costs are prohibitive for some students.

**SHEAF/ESPIGA** offsets travel costs.

## Post Secondary Scholarships

**SHEAF/ESPIGA** currently administers scholarships to five University students who have been supported since high school. The need for these scholarships is growing.
